COLLARS

A collar is a decorative and functional feature of a garment. When used for warmth it is both decorative and functional. When used as a decorative feature it frames the face and enhances both the garment and the owner.

Collars fall into two broad classifications:

- 1. Separate set-in collars (constructed separately, then attached to the neckline) such as "Peter Pan" and "Mandarin"
- 2. Collars cut and developed with the garment, such as "Shawl".

Regardless of classification, all collars fit into one of the following categories:

- 1. Flat Fitting
- 2. Rolled
- 3. Stand-up

A Flat Fitting Collar, regardless of width, rolls over from the neckline seam and either ripples or lies flat on the body, e.g. Peter Pan collar, Sailor collar.

• The <u>Peter Pan collar</u> is cut to fit around the curve of the neckline, and to lie flat upon the torso. It can be made either as one part, with a front-fastening bodice, or in two parts to accommodate a back fastening. The collar is small and soft, with rounded corners. This collar is mainly associated with children's wear.



• The <u>Sailor collar</u> is a broad collar having a square flap across the back and tapering to a V in the front. It is intended to lay flat on the back and shoulders of the wearer and contains no visible appearance of a roll. The collar is tailored after the traditional sailor's uniform. It is most commonly worn by women and children, a sailor collar is a quite traditional part of a nautical-themed outfit, and are often employed as part of a costume. The sailor collar is most visible in Trinidad & Tobago carnival with traditional bands portraying sailor costumes.









<u>A Rolled Collar</u>, regardless of width, is a collar that has a stand. It is differentiated from flat collars by a roll line that breaks the collar into stand and fall areas. A stand is the material under the collar at the centre back, which extends backward from the garment neckline to the point where the collar rolls over e.g. Shawl collar, Shirt and Convertible collar.

Parts of the rolled collar





• The <u>shirt collar</u> is the most common type of collar which rests adjacent to the face and helps frame it. The collar is also the most visible part of the shirt when worn with a jacket. Shirt collars are available in a wide range of shapes and sizes.

Men shirts

- The shirt collar is often referred to as a <u>convertible collar</u> because it can be worn button up or open with a lapel effect. Convertible collars are usually cut as one piece, unlike the banded shirt collar, which is cut in two pieces. Examples of convertible collars are seen on ladies tops or jackets and very popular with school shirts and blouses.
- The <u>shawl collar</u> is a combined lapel and collar in one piece, instead of a separate piece. It curves from the back of the neck down to the front closure of the garment. This collar is popular with bath robes and ladies garments.

<u>A Stand-Up Collar</u>, is a collar that has no rolled back. It is short, unfolded and stands up e.g. mandarin collar.


• The <u>Mandarin collar</u> is seen on both shirts and jackets. The collar either barely meets at the centre front or overlaps slightly. Mandarin collar suits have been around for centuries and is commonly seen in military wear as well as clothing for priests and clergymen.

• The <u>Nehru collar</u>, another style, was named after the Prime Minister of India 1947 – 1964, Jawaharlal Nehru who commonly wore clothing with this type of collar.



Flat collars lie flat at the neckline while rolled collars have a roll line that breaks the collar into stand and fall areas.


