

Hurricane Hazards

Natural hazards are natural events such as earthquakes, volcanic eruptions, hurricanes, etc. that have the potential to cause damage to people and their property.

The major threats or events associated with hurricanes in the Caribbean are:

- Landslides

Social


- Injury to yourself

Weather conditions at the following sections of a hurricane

- Eye this is the centre of the hurricane. Calm conditions are experienced. There are clear skies and the wind is gentle.
- Eye wall this is the area round the eye. This section has the strongest winds over 100km/hr. Huge towering cumulonimbus clouds are present which causes the heaviest rainfall.
- Rain bands this section is extensive and can and contains spirals of clouds that produce thunderstorms. It contains moisture-laden air and is responsible for the torrential rains for days in an area.

Three aspects of a hurricane that can threaten life and property?

- Strong winds
- Storm surge
- Heavy rainfall and inland flooding
- Landslides

Social Impacts

- 70 deaths were recorded with 200-300 people missing. Sixty people died on the island of Abaco and 10 on Grand Bahama.
- 9,000 homes were damaged or destroyed.
- Seven schools were destroyed and 45 educational facilities damaged, leading to the reassignment of 1,500 displaced students.
- 60,000 people were in need of food and water assistance.
- Thousands were traumatized and in need of counselling.

Economic Impacts

- The country experienced about United States \$3.4 billion dollars in losses.
- Nearly 29,500 people lost their jobs
- There was significant damage to tourism facilities.
- Disruption of medical supplies and electrical and water supply on Abaco and Grand Bahama.
- Severe damage to the Rand Memorial Hospital (RMH) and four clinics located in the eastern part of Grand Bahama.
- 31 Government damaged or destroyed.

Economic Impact

- The transport infrastructure, including roads, ports and airports was damaged on Abaco and Grand Bahama due to storm surge and strong winds.
- All the fishing processing facilities were affected.
- Several green houses were destroyed, and many crops were damaged by wind and intrusion of salt water from the sea.

Environmental Impacts

- Oil spilled out of the Norwegian energy company storage facility at Grand Bahama
- Wave action, storm surge and high winds produced partial to severe destruction to mangroves, coral reefs, seagrass beds and forests on both Abaco and Grand Bahama.
- There was the disappearance of habitats, and displacement of species, particularly the fishing industry.
