CURRICULUM CONTENT/Objectives

- Explore a variety of techniques for the creation of three-dimensional forms.
- develop knowledge and critical understanding of the art and design trends of different historical eras, traditions and cultures, with specific reference to the Caribbean
- Elements and Principles-An investigation of the elements and principles of Art and Design as they relate to three-dimensional work: (Elements: dot, line, shape, space, texture, form/mass, colour and value.
 Principles: balance, rhythm, proportion, repetition, pattern, emphasis, unity, variety and movement).

Today's learning activity focuses on:

developing connections between Art and Design and community, home and environment

Exploration of Techniques-Working in the round – Creating sculptures using found materials- fabric and other materials found at home by: Knotting, tying, modelling

How has your home, art-making experiences been over the last few weeks?

• SAMPLE activity Construct a creative art thinking corner in any room of your house as follows:

- 1. Collect at least 5 different items of varying sizes, shapes, and colours from around the house to set up your creative corner. For example, an old chair (any material), a large box, a broom, a mirror, a pot spoon, a pile of books-anything that appeals to you today!
- 2. Go through your wardrobe for pieces of old clothing: shoes, belts, hats, wraps, ties etc (any style, fabric, colour, size)

Setting up My Artist Self-Corner

Step 3

Imagine yourself in that corner for the next 20 mins. Use larger pieces of cloth (towels, bedsheet, old curtains to stuff and fill your selected shirt and pants etc to recreate a human form engaged in any activity that involves using the hands. You may need to find other materials to tie or fasten areas together. Use lots of knots! Be resourceful!

Step 4

Play any of your favorite songs as background music on your headphones or radio while you are engaged in re-creating your *Artist Self-Corner or art thinking space*.

Try incorporating any period of Art History in your design

Step 5. Have fun dancing to the tune of your fabric sculpting, while you think aloud musically, with your hands!







Textile or Fabric Sculpture may be described

as **experiential art**


Through experimentation, artists explore and express feelings, thoughts, ideas, issues and experiences by modelling with a variety of cloths, fabrics and other found materials.

To model and create **textile sculpture**, artists may use embroidery, stitchery, weaving, waxing, patchwork, trapunto, quilting, tatting and macramé, for example.

Who are some of the artists of the Caribbean who work with fabric-different types of cloth, yarn, threads etc.?

Look at the Look at the Work of Adele Todd, Adele Todd, for example.

According to Adele Todd, who has been working with embroidery thread as sculpture and Performance since 1999:



Here is another example of textile sculpture by an international textile artist, Judith Scott: "Uncovering innate talent"



Some artists, for example New York based Juliet Martin may weave the cloth first, then create the sculpture

You can also use your own hand-crafted fabrics for originality and inventiveness

For example, if you have done any batik or tie & dye pieces, the motifs and designs can inform the shape, form, tone and mood of your fabric sculpture in ingenious ways

What ideas do you have for finishing off this fabric sculpture entitled: *The steel pan player*?

How can his pan sticks, for example be made, depicted and added to complement the composition?



Fabric can also be sculpted and crafted into functional art



Here is an Essential Reading Activity

- Research and find out more about the history and development of Fabric Sculpture and Textile Design through the ages.
- For example, what more can you say about the themes and ideas expressed by late nineteenth and early twentieth century textile artists such as **Sonia Delaunay** (1885-1979) who was born in what is today Ukraine and lived and worked primarily in France. Her works were sometimes hand-sewn, screen-printed, or embroidered. Her work featured geometric areas of pure color. She and her husband, French artist Robert Delaunay, championed **orphism**, an art theory that emphasized form, color, and rhythm as simultaneous and independent of having to look like something else.
