Curriculum Topic: Prefixes

Teaching Point: A prefix is a letter or group of letters that can be added to the beginning of a root word. When added, it changes the meaning of the word.



Example: **un** (prefix) added to **tie** (root word) = **untie** (new word)

Some prefixes can have the same meaning. However, the root word determines which prefix should be used.

Note the prefixes in the table below.

Prefix	Meaning	Example
dis-	not, opposite of	dis like (do not like)
in-	not, opposite of	in complete (not complete)
non-	not, opposite of	non living (not living)
