The audience generally learns about characters by what:

- they say or do not say;
- they do or do not do; and
- others say or think about and treat them.

Literature is about people and the things that happen to them. As such, characters are used to help the reader/audience to understand the dynamic involved in how people react when they are placed in given situations. Some critics refer to this process as understanding the character's reasoning or motivation and attempt to examine how characters grow or stagnate.

In most literary works characters can be grouped as:

- Flat;
- Round;
- Stereotype; or
- Stock.

The main character in a literary work is considered as the **protagonis**t or hero/heroine. The **antagonist**, on the other hand, is the character with whom the main character my be in conflict. In the early European dramatic era, characters were named dependent on their roles/personalities. In has been documented that morality plays were hinged on characters who personified vices and virtues. This tradition of naming continues to influence today's practices.
